

Report from Thailand

On May 11, 2017, IKAJA held a kamishibai workshop at the 3rd Asia Oceania Regional Congress of the International Board on Books for Young People (IBBY). Avery Udagawa, who translates Kamishibai Newsletter and lives in Bangkok, assisted. We affirmed the delights of kamishibai with about thirty people from Thailand, Hong Kong, Cambodia, Australia, Nepal, and beyond. Avery performed *Densha ga kuru yo* (Here Comes the Train) with vigor, and two participants performed kamishibai for the first time in their lives, with their eyes sparkling!

Report from Malaysia

As IKAJA's international project supervisor, I traveled from Bangkok to Malaysia to present the Malaysia Board on Books for Young People (MBBY) Fourth Kamishibai Seminar at the University of Malaya, May 13-14, 2017. There were 18 participants, who were staff of the National Poison Center of University Science Malaysia (USM) in Penang, teaching

staff from the University Selangor (UNISEL), teachers, children's writers and illustrators, and librarians from the National Library of Malaysia and Kuala Lumpur City Library. The first day of the seminar was an introduction of basic kamishibai technique, and the second was a seminar for advanced learners on With participants at the kamishibai workshop in Kuala Lumpur.



the theme, "How to Create Kamishibai." At the end of the sessions, it was gratifying to see that participants could learn and perform kamishibai. There is a special interest in kamishibai in Malaysia now, as MBBY is encouraging members to use it when promoting stories and reading to children in libraries, schools and kindergartens. MBBY is an IKAJA group member; IKAJA Malaysia (IKAMA) formed in 2013 and now has more than 40 individual members. The liaison officer of IKAMA is Ms. Alimah Salam, who is one of the founder members of Malaysia IBBY.

Report from Germany

In October, I held a kamishibai seminar at the Bensheim City Library in a suburb of Frankfurt. The seminar was timed to coincide with a donation of twelve kamishibai works and a stage from the group Karl Kübel Stiftung für Kind und Familie (Karl Kübel Stiftung Organization for Children and Families). I shared with the audience about kamishibai as a culture of *kyokan*. The audience consisted mainly of early childhood educators, many of whom were

seeing kamishibai for the first time. They talked excitedly afterward about potential uses of kamishibai in awakening interest in language, and in integrating children of refugees, whose numbers have risen sharply.
